For Your Reflection

From Bishop Chad Zielinski of the Diocese of Fairbanks, Alaska

We all have our favorite scriptures or scenes from the Gospel. One of the most powerful for me comes at the end of John's Gospel, when after the resurrection, Jesus finds Peter fishing. I find it amazing that after Jesus rose from the dead, the disciples were confused about their mission. Jesus had already appeared to them twice, but they still returned to their familiar livelihood of fishing and had caught nothing. Yet, Jesus remains present amidst this confusion and fruitless work. He gives the disciples simple instructions to toss the net over the other side of the boat and that results in a tremendously abundant catch of fish.

Peter no doubt wanted to keep Christ at a distance, being so ashamed of having denied Him three times. But Jesus looks at Peter man to man, piercing his soul with a forgiving and hopeful gaze. He invites Peter to embrace his capacity for goodness with a simple question: do you love me? Each question penetrates Peter's wounds and reveals his feelings of unworthiness. Peter could have again said, "*depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man,*" but Peter is instead empowered by the Risen Christ to leave and to serve God's people, having just encountered his own enormous capacity to love.

In this Gospel scene, Jesus demonstrates His unrelenting desire to be close to Peter and to all of us. Every Christmas, we are reminded that God desires to be so close to us He became flesh and dwelt among us (John:14.) Christ draws near to us even now, especially in the sacraments, and above all, in the Eucharist, where we truly encounter Him and are transformed. The marvelous truth of the Eucharist is that in choosing to commune with us, Christ announces the goodness of God's sacred design etched into our very being. Christmas is an invitation to draw closer to Christ, and embrace Him, be transformed, and go help others recognize their capacity to love, because goodness lives within all of us.

You see this especially at Christmas when even non-religious people desire to be generous and kind to others. There is an instinct within each person to move toward the good. God's desire to show us what is good breaks forth into our world in the Incarnation of His Son Jesus Christ. Yes, there is a quietness in the birth of Christ, but there also is a cry to the world that our creator has given us the gift of gifts. As the angel Gabriel proclaimed to the Shepherds, "*I am bringing you good news of great joy for all people. To you is Born This Day in the city of David a savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord.*" God is always crying out His love, if we have ears to hear. Our world is wounded and crying out. God allows us to choose good or evil and sadly, too often we choose sin and violate the human dignity of others and ourselves. Despite the abuse, violence and oppression so prevalent today, however, deep down people still desire and encounter with true goodness. At the root of the most personal and social problems is an unrequited desire for the one who is all good, Jesus Christ. We sense we are capable of greater love than our sins reflect.

When we hear Christmas carols and reflect on manger scenes, do we hear Jesus's question? Christ asks us, "*Do you love me*" because our lives and purpose are important to Him. I suspect most of us would like someone to ask us that question directly, so we can look within ourselves and confirm that deep capacity to love. Maybe our ability to love is wounded in some way, but Christ's birth brings hope and healing. As disciples together on the journey, may we take a moment this season to courageously ask one another, "*Do you love me?*" Let us also assist others to hear and answer this important question. In doing so we acknowledge that Christ has given all people and incredible capacity to love, with Him as our model. May the spirit of a Happy, Holy and Merry Christmas remain with you as we continue to celebrate the Christmas Season!

Respect Life: Dutch Patients Condemned to Euthanasia Can Be Drugged to Prevent Resistance

A few years ago, Dutch doctor, Marinou Arends, attended to her dementia patient in a nursing home, not to treat her, but to kill her by lethal injection. To make it easier, Arends drugged her patient's coffee in violation of euthanasia rules. But the patient woke up, saw what was happening, and began to struggle. The doctor told the family to hold her down while she killed her. A criminal prosecution was mounted for murder, but the Dutch Supreme Court dismissed all criminal complaints and praised the doctor's good intentions. The Netherlands is "Euthanasia Land," and now the Dutch have created specific rules euthanasia for dementia patients which allow drugging patients to prevent resistance. Doctors euthanizing patients with dementia may slip a sedative into their food or drink if there is concern they will become "*disturbed, agitated or aggressive.*" But in the Arends story, the patient had asked for euthanasia, but she wanted to decide when. She never did. So, the rules were changed to govern that circumstance. The new code says where a patient has advanced dementia, "*it is not necessary for the doctor to agree with the patient on the time or manner in which euthanasia will be given.*" If a patient does not want to die, and the doctor disagrees, the Dutch court permits the doctor to get away with murder. The Dutch are more concerned with ensuring doctors who kill people are not prosecuted than in protecting the vulnerable. (thebridgehead.ca; Nov 26, 2020)
